O-4-2022-011 ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK.

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:4-45.1 <u>et seq.</u>, provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to **3.5%** over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and

WHEREAS, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and

WHEREAS, the Township Council of the Township of Monroe, in the County of Middlesex, finds its advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2022 Budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens: and

WHEREAS, the Township Council hereby determines that a 1.0% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$465,634.97 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and

WHEREAS, the Township Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Monroe, in the County of Middlesex, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the **CY 2022** budget year, the final appropriations of the Township of Monroe shall, in accordance with this ordinance and <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:4-45.14, be increased by **3.5%**, amounting to **\$1,629,722.40**, and that the **CY 2022** municipal budget for the Township of Monroe be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance, as introduced, be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within five (5) days of introduction; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that a certified copy of this ordinance, upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED This Ordinance shall take effect upon final passage and publication as provided by law.

WHEREAS, land use is an essential component of overall sustainability for a municipality; and

WHEREAS, poor land-use decisions can lead to and increase societal ills such as decreased mobility, high housing costs, increased greenhouse gas emissions, loss of open space and the degradation of natural resources; and

WHEREAS, well planned land use can create transportation choices, provide for a range of housing options, create walkable communities, preserve open space, provide for adequate recreation, and allow for the continued protection and use of vital natural resources; and

WHEREAS, Given New Jersey's strong tradition of home rule and local authority over planning and zoning, achieving a statewide sustainable land use pattern will require municipalities to take the lead;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Council or the Township of Monroe, County of Middles, State of New Jersey that Monroe Township resolves to take the following steps with regard to our municipal land use decisions with the intent of making Monroe Township a truly sustainable community. It is our intent to include these principles in the next master plan revision and reexamination report and to update our land-use zoning, natural resource protection, and other ordinances accordingly.

Regional Cooperation - We pledge to reach out to administrations of our neighboring municipalities concerning land-use decisions, and to take into consideration regional impacts when making land-use decisions.

Transportation Choices - We pledge to create transportation choices with a Complete Streets approach by considering all modes of transportation, including walking, biking, transit and automobiles, when planning transportation projects and reviewing development applications. We will reevaluate our parking

with the goal of limiting the amount of required parking spaces, promoting shared parking and other innovative parking alternatives, and encouraging structured parking alternatives where appropriate.

Natural Resource Protection - We pledge to take action to protect the natural resources of the State for environmental, recreational and agricultural value, avoiding or mitigating negative impacts to these resources. Further, we pledge use our Natural Resources Inventory in our land-use decision-making processes and open space planning.

Mayor's Budget/Township Update – Mayor Dalina explained the process of meeting with the Department heads to discuss the budget and clarified that his intent with his presentation tonight is to explain what is happening within the Township. He noted that at next month's meeting there will be a public hearing and adoption of the budget; he surmised that this is the Township's 7th year of having a AA+ bond rating allowing the ability to do more with less. The new bonds are at a 1.35% rate, and we have reduced the debt by \$1.3 million in the last 5 years. He also shared that we have the lowest water and sewer rates in the region and continue to provide the best services to our residents with our Emergency Medical Services, Police Department, Senior Center, Recreation Center, and Library. Lastly, Mayor Dalina added that we will continue to fight for our fair share of funding through state advocacy and reminded everyone of what a great community we live in.

Administrator's Report – Administrator Weinberg thanked the Finance Department and their staff for putting the budget together and to piggyback on what Mayor Dalina said, we have worked hard to have the 2^{nd} overall effective tax rate in the County.

Highlighted that we have received 12 bids for the Costco Drive Improvement Project and it is important to note that we have received a grant from the State in the amount of \$600,000 which is great.

The County has notified the Township that they will begin paving on Buckelew Avenue from Grace Hill Road to Schoolhouse Road in mid-May.

Reported that as the solar landscape moves forward, we will update how residents can sign up.

We approved a couple of utility items tonight with the approval to paint the water tank on Half Acre Road which will help extend its life and we will move forward with Well 25.

Lastly, the Parks Department is looking to hire seasonal employees, and anyone interested should reach out to our Human Resources Department. He also mentioned that the Recreation Department is also looking for summer camp counselors, anyone interested needs to at least be going into sophomore year and can reach out to the Recreation Department for more information.

Engineer's Report – No Report - absent.

Council's Reports -

<u>Councilwoman Schneider –</u>

- Reported on expanded transportation services for the disabled community.
- REPLENISH had a food drive last Saturday held at the Park & Ride on Applegarth Road which was a very successful event.
- Highlighted the Mayor's Wellness Campaign Bike Ride Kick-off and noted how she enjoyed seeing everyone from all ages participating. She mentioned she helped pass out healthy snacks to all who participated.
- Reported that the Library now offers walk-in notary services free of charge.
- The Community Garden plant sale is scheduled for May 14th.

Councilwoman Siegel -

- Thanked the Departments for their budget presentations.
- Announced that the Cultural Arts Commission held auditions for "Once Upon a Mattress" which will premiere in July.
- The Historic Preservation Commission hosted an Open house event at the Dey Farm.
- The Environmental Commission hosted a community clean up event last week.
- Reminded everyone that "Bag Up NJ" begins on May 4th.

<u>Council Vice-President Van Dzura –</u>

- Complimented Mayor Dalina and the Administration on the budget presentations and for the second year in a row of no tax increases.
- Happy to see the Solar Energy Program moving forward as green energy continues to be a topic of importance.
- Reported that he would like to see the advance of the electric charging stations around the Township and look into investing in solar panels on the telephone poles.
- Shared that he is a strong supporter of offering licenses for businesses to cultivate cannabis; went on to say that on April 23rd the opening of sales for recreational cannabis began. He stated that he understands why our Council previously voted against allowing for this use because if no action took place then we would be disallowed from taking any action for the next 5 years but strongly recommended looking at the projected revenue and how it would benefit our Township to consider allowing cannabis businesses to operate here in the future.
- Gave an update on the war in Ukraine and noted that he supports the right to free press.
- Suggested to have a link on the Township website that highlights residents and tell their stories; shared that resident Nancy Fichtelberg has been making and delivering soup to the seniors in Rossmoor.

<u>Councilman Dipierro –</u>

- Reported that the Shade Tree Commission distributed tree seedlings last week.
- Shared that he sent an email to CME Associates in regards to the Avenue K and Spotswood Gravel Hill Road paving job.
- Asked for an update on how many certificates of occupancy and building permits have been given for the affordable housing projects being built.
- Happy to see all of the directors working together to discuss how to move Monroe forward.
- Stated that he has not heard anything regarding the BFI update and asked when construction would begin, if there was a general update and if there is any high water table to be concerned about; Director Stroin responded that based on the update received this morning there is 16,000 feet of pipe that will be delivered to Pump Station 6 and once delivered he would venture to say that construction and drilling should begin within two weeks. He added that there is no concern over a high-water table.
- Suggested that we put a timeframe on the weight limits of the trucks traveling our roadways.
- Reported that Diane and Michael Smith are awaiting a response from the Township Engineer is regard to flooding issues on Bordentown Turnpike.
- Reported that the beacon on Monmouth Road finally works again near the Recreation Center and the park on Prospect Plains Road is waiting on the playground equipment to be delivered.
- Regarding the budget, Councilman Dipierro asked where the rollback taxes go and the tie in fees for water and sewer; Administrator Weinberg answered that everything is in the annual Financial Statement; Council President Cohen added that the budget will be introduced at next month's council meeting and that will be an appropriate time to ask direct questions regarding the budget. CFO George Lang answered that they become part of the overall tax levy.
- Wished a Happy Mother's Day to all.

Council President Cohen -

- Glad to see how well the information session was handled as it provided relevance to the budget discussions, and she hopes in moving forward into next year that more residents join.
- Reported that the Affordable Housing Board met and were able to provide assistance in the form of rehabilitating homes damaged by the flood in Rossmoor.
- The Mayor's Wellness Campaign kicked off with a bike ride on Avenue K; shared that another bike ride event may be forthcoming.
- Shared that the Health Advisory Board will have a booth during the National Night Out which she is looking forward to.

Mayor's Report – Mayor Dalina shared that it is Teacher Appreciation Week and acknowledged all of the hard work the wonderful teachers do in our schools.

Also reported that it is Municipal Clerk's Week and thanked Township Clerk Patricia Reid, Deputy Clerks Christine Robbins and Tanya Pannucci along with Lorena Thompson and Alicia Gonzalez for all of their hard work in that office.

Attended the Knights of Columbus's 50th Anniversary event.

Mentioned there will be additional installations of charging stations around the Township.

Reported that the Costco Drive Improvement Project will be 90% funded.

MTHS Armed Forces Appreciation Day will be held on May 6th at the high school auditorium.

The American Legion will have Memorial Day Services.

Wished a Happy Mother's Day to all.

UPON MOTION made by Councilman Dipierro and seconded by Councilwoman Schneider, the **PUBLIC COMMENTS** portion of the Meeting was opened. All were in favor, none opposed.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Peter Tufano, 10 Catherine St. – Mr. Tufano asked if the shuttle bus that was mentioned by Councilwoman Schneider could possibly be shared with the high school as there are a lot of special needs high school students that participate in sports, and it would be nice to extend that service to help get those students home after such events.

In response to Council Vice-President Van Dzura's report on the cannabis legalization, Mr. Tufano added that being high on marijuana is difficult to prove and report so that may have contributed to the low report on numbers.

Stated that last year he came before Council to discuss the flooding issues he is having on his property caused by his neighbor and again he woke up today to 4" of water in his basement. He stated that he wants someone to get back to me and get this resolved.

<u>Prakash Parab, 33 Dayna Dr.</u> – Mr. Parab commented that Rossmoor is an all-electric community and the bills incurred by the residents are very high so he hopes that the solar energy program will help the residents living there.

Invited everyone to attend the Om Parikh 5K event being held at Thompson Park on May 15th.

Shared that there are Federal and State programs that provide \$5,000 rebates to homeowners who are changing out their entire heating and cooling systems and this is something our residents should look into.

<u>George Gunkelman, 5 Kelly Ct</u>. – Mr. Gunkelman asked in regard to the electric vehicle charging stations if we have any intended planned use and if the grant requires us to state what our intention is or if this is a generalized grant application. He also asked if the user would have to pay to use the charging stations; Administrator Weinberg answered that when we apply this will be for three charging stations and if we get the grant the stations come free but we would have to install them. He added that we will also apply for three electric vehicles, noting that there is a benefit to both, paying and free use which, will be part of the application process. He shared that early on many municipalities were offered the service for free but now it has moved toward paid and we are in the middle ground right now.

Mr. Gunkelman asked if the food bank receives any help from the County, State or Federal government food bank programs; Administrator Weinberg answered that we would very closely with REPLENISH which is the County's coordinating facility.

<u>Elizabeth Fagan, 21 Woodcrest Cir</u>. – Ms. Fagan commented that with the water and sewer cost she understands it is lower but wants to remind everyone that several residents have septic systems and are not tapped into the sewer.

Ms. Fagan commented that the Township has a lot of public buildings, and the Senior Center has a reputation of being difficult to gain access to rent space. She asked why we have so many halls and commented that the firehouses being built are huge, adding that she understands they are open to the public to use but wants to know why we are charging so much to use these facilities and when does public buildings not become public.

Asked if we have considered going back to having meetings with representatives from every department as this used to be done years ago.

Lastly, Ms. Fagan commented that the Calendar of Events on the Township's website should include events being held at the schools as the information for school events is hard to find.

<u>Michele Arminio, 9 Nathaniel St.</u> – Mrs. Arminio asked in regard to R-5-2022-151 if some of the cost will be coming from the State and if it will help the flooding in that area. She also asked as to why the DPW is not doing the paving as she believed we had machinery to do this type of work; Attorney Rainone answered that 90% of the costs will be covered by the State.

In regard to R-5-2022-141, Mrs. Arminio asked where Well 25 is located and if it is located on municipal use land as she believes that land was given as an Open Space exchange and was supposed to be designated as such; Administrator Weinberg answered that the property is located on Spotswood-Englishtown Road near Matchaponix Avenue, close to where Center State Engineering is and it is municipal land.

Mrs. Arminio commented in regard to R-5-2022-143 that the well is close to the landfill and she is concerned we will eventually find out the leachate has made its way into the well; Director Stroin responded that there should be no migration of the leachate off-site.

Peter Simon, 159C Pelham Lane - Mr. Simon shared that there is an issue with speeding trucks near Rossmoor and would like to recommend the speed limit be reduced as a means to discourage trucks from taking these roads as shortcuts. He stated that two weeks ago a tractor trailer took out a light over on Applegarth Road and there were no proper detours or police oversight. He added that there was also an overturned tractor trailer at the exit 8A turnpike entrance a few weeks ago and there was no police enforcement present to direct traffic. Mr. Simon asked what could be done to step up the enforcement; Administrator Weinberg responded that we will certainly mention to the Chief of Police about enforcing the engine breaking and we are continuing to reduce the number of trucks heading to Cranbury through Monroe. The County is also moving forward on a southern Middlesex County traffic study which will hopefully provide a path forward to implementing truck restrictions.

UPON MOTION made by Councilman Dipierro and seconded by Councilwoman Schneider, the **PUBLIC COMMENTS** portion of the Meeting was closed. All were in favor, none opposed.

UPON MOTION made by Councilman Dipierro and seconded by Councilwoman Siegel, the Regular Meeting was Adjourned at 8:48pm.
